

02. Palliative care: Words or touch in the pre-intubation phase of critically ill Covid 19 patients

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Background-objective: We recorded our clinical experience with Covid 19 patients.

Material and methods: We conducted a study of 154 Covid 19 patients (38 to 84 years old), ASA I, II, III. We recorded palliative care, words or touch in the pre-intubation period of Covid 19 patients inside the rooms of the various clinics.

The priorities were: to define the management of these patients, based on:

- 1. To confirm that everything will be fine. (integrated care model, fear of death).
- 2. To maintain dignity based on individual respect.
- 3. To attempt transferring Covid 19 patients to an ICU.
- 4. To inform relatives and friends. (communication skills).
- 5. To inform correctly so that to gain us confidence for the subsequent medical care of Covid 19 patients.
- 6. Support for palliative care.
- All patients felt mental exhaustion before intubation.
- Need palliative care, to pass Golgotha.

Results: All patients in the pre- intubation phase need palliative care. It is an expression of the true human attitude to care immediately for Covid 19 patient who is no longer breathing. Help me doctor, I can't breathe. Palliative care is only provided in words, because touch is not possible with the scary protective equipment, the clothing worn by the anaesthesiologist.

Conclusions: The experience is unprecedented, unique. But we can also say: educational. We learned communication skills based on continuing education of the Greek society of pain and palliative care.
